





Napa and Suisun Valley. On and after the 12th inst., Bushnell's Ferry across Lake Washington, the near est practicable route to and from Sacramento City, will be open to the travelling community at all times. Thankful for past favors hopes to merit a continuance of the same.

A Long Rope.—In Yolo county, says the State Journal, the late rains have increased the size of Lake Washington until it is now at the ferry, five miles wide. The boat still makes its regular trips, the ropes having been stretched almost four miles and a half. All of the low tule lands are overflowed.

Sacramento Daily Union, November 8th, 1856

LAKE WASHINGTON .- Three miles from Washington, in Yolo county, Lake Washington is situate. It is a body of water about six miles in length, and in many places over six hundred yards wide. It is a great place of resort for sportsmen during the hunting season. On Thursday last, an otter, four feet and a half in length, was killed there by Dr. J. P. Sharkey, of Sacramento. This lake is said to be some six feet higher than the Scramento river, and if any system of irrigation were adopted, the lake could be made to supply water for thousands of acres of land lying between it and the river.

Lake Washington in the 1800s

Sacramento Daily Union, April 2nd, 1861

An Act to amend an Act for the protection of game [prohibiting the killing of any flat-billed duck between the 1st of March and the 5th of September, except in the counties of San Bernardino and Los Angeles, where they may be killed between the 1st of August and the 1st of April.

Mr. Morrison stated that he had introduced that bill because young ducks were killed in such numbers and at such times that soon they would be extinct in the State. Recently, 2,000 young ducks were killed on one day on Washington Lake, Yolo county. The bill was

passed.

Sacramento Daily Union, December 13th, 1865

Petition of John McLaren, representing that he is the owner of a lake—called Washington Lake—in District No. 18; that formerly said lake was used by him as a fishery, and brought him an income of \$1,500 per year; that by reason of the canal in said District having been turned through said lake the waters thereof have been greatly diminished during the fishing season; that the fishes which in former times did continually and contentedly disport themselves therein until called for, do now evacuate his premises by means of said canal in great multitudes; that he is damaged thereby at least \$1,000 per year, and praying that a weir may be set to prevent the escape of the fugitives, was read and placed on file for reference to Committee on Accounts.

Sacramento Daily Union, November 14th, 1885

RAID ON FISHERMEN. — On Thursday night four men went out to Washington lake, where some Chinamen are engaged in taking fish, and robbed several submerged fish cages of their contents, securing altogether about 800 pounds of fish. The raiders were armed with guns, and when the Chinese remonstrated against the robbery they were silenced by threats of violence. The men are known, and warrants were out yesterday for their arrest.



Inspection of the City—Call on Governor Booth
—Fishing Excursion—The Professor's Views—
Lecture—Reception.

Professor Agassiz spent a few hours yesterday forenoon in making a tour of the city, viewing its various objects of interest. He called upon Governor Booth and was received with great cordiality. In the afternoon a party consisting of the Professor, his wife, Dr. Steindachoer, B. B. Redding, Fish Commissioner of the State of California, Drs. Simmons, Logan. Montgomery, Nelson and Curtis, Rev. J. H. C. Bonte and i. N. Hoag, Corresponding Secretary of the State Agricultural Society, left the city on a fishing expedition, for the purpose of catching new varieties of fish. The party first visited Washington Lake, in Yolo county, about three or four miles southwest of Sacramento. It was expected that they would meet fishermen fishing with nets, but they were much disappointed to find that they were not on the ground. Dr. Steindachner caught a fresh water mussel in the lake and appeared to prize the fish very highly.







"Lake Washington in West Sacramento will today be the mecca of lovers of water sports. The biggest regatta ever held on fresh water west of the river starts at 11 o'clock this morning and will continue throughout the afternoon with the best oarsmen, swimmers, divers and water poloists on the coast entered in the various events. In addition a flycasting tournament of bigger proportions than ever before attempted here will be on the day's program. The day's festivities start this morning with a novel street parade in which the visiting bay city oarsmen will march up K street about 8 o'clock after their arrival on a specially chartered river steamer. The line of march will extend up K street to the Hotel Sacramento where the Fifth regiment band of San Francisco will give a free open air concert at 10 o'clock. The scene will then be shifted to Lake Washington for the big regatta after which the contestants will return and another free band concert will be given at 7 o'clock in the evening.

Wilson, manager of the land sales department of the company. The arguments were filed.

Sacramento Bee: July 23rd, 1927

- 250 acres had originally been set aside for a park.
- The Alaska Packers property on the west shore was planted with a peach orchard and alfalfa fields.
- The lake was about ten feet deep.

LAKE WASHINGTON IS BEAUTY SPOT

Large Body Of Water In West Sacramento District Edged With Trees

WEST SACRAMENTO, July 23.—
One of the chief beauty spots of the West Sacramento section is Lake Washington, which extends southeast from the Yolo Causeway to the Jefferson Boulevard, the main road of travel in this district. The lake, which is a natural lake bed augmented by water pumped into the district for irrigation purposes, is four miles long, a third of a mile wide and about ten feet deep.

History of Pleasure Boating in Sacramento

- 1860s-1880s: At least ten rowing clubs formed during this time period.
 - The Undine Boat Club was one of the largest
- 1860s: Sailing regattas were held on the Sacramento River, often on July 4th.
- Early 1900s: Power boating started to become popular; power boat races were held.
- 1934: LWSC was organized.

SACRAMENTO REGATTA CLUB.-A meeting of the Sacramento Regatta Club was held at the Bridge House last evening. The days for the sailing and rowing matches and the prizes were fixed as follows: Monday, September 19-first class sail boats, first prize, \$150; second prize, \$50. Same day-Whitehall boats with one pair of sculls, \$50 and \$25. Wednesday, September 21second class sail boats, first prize, \$100; second prize, \$50. Same day-Whitehall boats, two pair of sculls, \$50 and \$25. Friday, September 23-Whitehall sail boats without center boards, first prize, \$100; second prize, \$50. Same day-\$150 for any row boat; and also Whitehall boats with three pairs of sculls, \$50 and \$25. It is probable that other prizes will be offered.

We understand that the Independent Sacramento Regatta Club, which meets at Cady & Morrison's, on Front street, has made arrangements for a race, on the same day, between the Pride of the Capital and the Prairie Bird. The sum of \$250 on each side has been, or will be, put up, as soon as the terms of the race in detail are arranged. The two boats differ materially in size, which circumstance renders it necessary that the proper discount be allowed to the one which carries the least sail. Both boats are owned at Washington, and are well known to those of our citizens who are addicted to boat riding.

Many Sacramento boat owners are busy polishing their craft, others mending their The breezes fill trim-cut sails that send the boats gliding swiftly and silently along. The lake is re-served for the sailers and no motor boats are allowed on it.

Formed Two Years Ago Two years ago several Sacramentans, interested in sailing, met at the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce to discuss the posibilities of organizing a club. Organization up to that time had been discouraged because there was no suitable place to sail. The Sacramento River was ruled out by the swift current and the unreliable wind. Then Lake Washington was suggested, which settled the problem.

The group organized the Lake Washington Sailing Club, and started seeking members. The club's growth was steady and to-day there is a membership of twenty-






Early History of LWSC

- LWSC was formed on September 17, 1934 by Al (A.A.) Saville and others
 - Saville had formed Sea Scouts Ship No. 3 in 1932 and was the commodore (or vice commodore?) of the Sacramento District of Sea Scouts
- First clubhouse was built in October 1935.
- The club's first regatta has held on July 4th, 1936.
- In 1938, LWSC joined the Small Boat Racing Association of Northern California (SBRANC) and began competing regularly against other sailing clubs, including Clear Lake Yacht Club, Corinthian Yacht Club, Ionic Sailing Club (now Stockton Sailing Club), Lake Merritt Sailing Club, Richardson Bay Yacht Club and San Francisco Yacht Club.
- The first major regatta hosted by LWSC was the 1938 SBRANC spring regatta. Classes included the Snipe, Sun, Moon, and National One Design.
- The Snipe was the primary boat sailed in the early days of the club. The club was home to Snipe fleet # 58.
- Nils (N.H.) Lund, a founding member of the club, designed an 11-foot dinghy called the Bug, which was also popular with club members.






Early LWSC History Continued

- In the 1940s, International 14s and El Toros joined the Snipe as boats popular with club members
- In 1945, a boathouse to store boats was purchased from the Sacramento Junior College rowing program.
- In the 1950s the Penguin became a popular boat; regattas attracted over 100 boats.
- 1956-62: Boy Scouts held the Al Saville regatta; location of the regatta moved between Sacramento or Rio Vista; the regatta included sailing and seamanship events. Saville trophy was awarded to the winner.

Early Members

- A.A. Saville founder of LWSC and second club commodore.
- Norman Ford first commodore and manager of the Alaska Packers.
- N.H. Lund designed and built the Bug dinghy, which was sailed by many club members.
- Ben Butler –third LWSC commodore
- Earl Barnett architect who designed the Memorial Auditorium and the Sutter Club.





been recognized as one of the best
black bass waters in Northern California, if not in the entire state.

The opening of the lake to the public will occur next Sunday, June 22. The West Sacramento Land company has made considerable preparation to make the day a gala event. The Fifth Infantry band, San Francisco, will supply the music, and there will be flycasting, swimming and diving features, as well as a regatta between the Dolphin Boat club of Sacramento and the best local oarsmen. The Alameda oarsmen—champions—will be here also.


The California Fish and Game commission, now that Lake Washington is no longer a private property restricted to private use, has taken an interest in the lake, and has announced that it will see that the waters are stocked with the best of Eastern game fish, and the commission will also endeavor to keep the lake well stocked with fish at all times.

During the coming week the lake will be seined, and the thousands of carp that now infest the water will be taken out. The black bass will be returned to be caught by anglers from time to time.


No expense is being spared by the West Sacramento Land company in fitting up the place as a pleasure resort. The Sacramento Fly Casters' club will make this lake the scene of its tournaments this summer, and several contests have already been arranged.

The San Francisco fly casters will be challenged to compete for a season's record cup. A trophy will be given for the best cast made by a man, and another for the record made by a woman. No professionals, however, will be allowed to compete for the prizes.


